Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj (MVPS) was founded in 1914 in a time when 80% of India's population was illiterate, and society faced poverty and outdated customs. A group of young activists, believing in education as a means of social reform, began raising awareness and encouraging families to send their children to school. They initially supported five students by providing hostel facilities in a rented house. As awareness grew, the community began contributing financially and in-kind to the cause.

Overcoming many challenges, the organization acquired land in 1919 and, in 1920, laid the foundation for the Udaji Boarding hostel, with contributions from Rajarshi Chhatrapati Shahu Maharaj and the Crawford Market Marathi community. This hostel became a symbol of collective effort for the education of marginalized students.

In 2020, MVPS preserved the building as the Udaji Maharaj Museum of Education Heritage, India's first museum dedicated solely to education. This museum honours the legacy of those who contributed to the institution, reflecting the cultural values and collective spirit that shaped its mission of social and educational empowerment. Udaji Maharaj Museum of Education Heritage is the museum having education as a main theme itself is the innovative initiatives as we can find museums of culture, artefacts, instrument but it is the museum with theme and includes artifacts, manuscripts, coins, thematic description etc. MVP through the museum has taken innovative approach towards educating people.
